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### What this document is about



This document is from Auckland Council.



**Council** means the people who make choices about how to run a town / city.



There is going to be a **local election** in 2025.



A **local election** is when people can vote for who is on the council.




This Easy Read document has information about being a **candidate** in the local election.



### Being a candidate means:

- saying you want to be part of Auckland Council
- asking people to vote for you in the election.



### Who is on Auckland Council



Auckland Council is made up of:

- the Governing Body
- local boards.



The Governing Body makes choices for the whole of Auckland.

It is made up of:

- the mayor
- 20 councillors.



The **mayor** is the leader of the council.



**Councillors** are the people on the council.

Councillors speak for their ward.



A ward is a part of a town / city.



Local boards make choices about how to run things in their part of a town / city.



There are 21 local boards in Auckland Council.



You can choose to be a candidate for:

- the mayor
- a councillor for a ward
- a member of a local board.

### What does an elected member do?



An **elected member** is anyone who has been voted on to Auckland Council.



Elected members make choices about how Auckland Council should spend its money.



Elected members need to think about:



what people in Auckland need



- how to support businesses to do well
- what Auckland could be like in the future.











Some of the things elected members do are:

- read information to get ready for meetings
- have meetings with:
  - the Governing Body / local board
  - o committees.

A **committee** is a group of people who work on something together.

Elected members also talk to all sorts of people about their:

- o needs
- o ideas
- o worries.





- openings for things like new parks
- events like:
  - Matariki
  - o Chinese New Year
  - Pasifika Festival
- community activities like working bees.





Matariki is the Māori new year.

We celebrate Matariki in June or July.



### Who can be a candidate





To be a candidate you must be:

- a New Zealand citizen
- at least 18 years old
- enrolled on the electoral roll.







A **New Zealand citizen** is someone who can get a New Zealand passport.

Many New Zealand citizens are born in New Zealand.

Some people who come to live in New Zealand from overseas also become New Zealand citizens.



The **electoral roll** is a list of all the people who can vote in Aotearoa New Zealand.



All sorts of people can be candidates.



It is good to have people on the council with different:

- skills
- experience.



Being an elected member can take a lot of time.

You cannot just work **office hours**.



#### Office hours means:

- 9 am to 5 pm
- Monday to Friday.



Your hours will not be the same every day.




Elected members need to have a commitment to Te Tiriti o Waitangi.



### A commitment to Te Tiriti o Waitangi means you:

- understand about Te Tiriti o
   Waitangi
- will work to support **Māori rights**.









It is about Māori and the New Zealand Government:



- making decisions together
- protecting things that are important to Māori.



### Māori rights are things like:

- being in charge of their land
- having a say in government
- being able to do things in a Māori way.





It is also good if elected members know about:

- iwi / groups of Māori in the Auckland area
- te ao Māori which is the Māori world
- tikanga which means the right way to do things.



Elected members need to be confident speaking at:

- meetings
- events.



**Confident** means being sure of yourself.






You will need to be able to say what you think clearly.



Elected members need to be able to use:

- email
- a smart phone








Elected members need to be able to understand different:

- ideas
- opinions.





Elected members need to understand the **consequences** of their choices.



**Consequences** are things that happen because of something else.

For example if you spend a lot of money on one thing there might not be enough left over for other things.



Elected members need to:

- get along with lots of different people.
- work with people they do not agree with.



## How much money are elected members paid?



Local board members work from 12 to 24 hours a week.



Local board members are paid from around 31 thousand dollars to just over 50 thousand dollars a year.



Boards with bigger local areas pay more money.



Each local board chooses someone to be the:

- chair
- deputy chair.



**Chair** means the person who leads the meetings.

**Deputy chair** means the person who leads the meetings if the chair is away.



These people work from 20 to 40 hours a week.



They are paid from around
37 thousand dollars to a bit over
1 hundred thousand dollars a year.







- full time
- at least 40 hours a week.



Councillors are paid a bit more than 1 hundred thousand dollars a year.

### The mayor works:

- full time
- more than 40 hours a week
- on weekends / evenings.







The mayor is paid a bit more than 3 hundred thousand dollars a year.

#### **Nominations** for candidates:

- open on Friday 4 July 2025
- close on Friday 1 August 2025.



**Nominations** are when people say they want to be a candidate in an election.




There will be more information about nominations when it is closer to nominations opening.



We will find out who all the candidates are on Friday 8 August 2025.







Voting:





 ends on Saturday 11 October 2025.



We will find out the **preliminary election results** on Saturday 11 October 2025.



**Preliminary election results** are the first results.

They may change after someone has checked them.



Candidates will know for sure if they are on the council sometime between:

• Monday 13 October 2025



### and

• Friday 17 October 2025.
